“Every Child is Different”: A Patient-First Approach for Treating Epilepsy at Gillette

Treating epilepsy has to be customized to each child. One size never seems to fit all.

For approximately two-thirds of the children we see, we'll come to some kind of solution through medication to control seizures. In this quest, we hope to find that perfect balance of seizure control and freedom from medication side effects.

But for that last third of kids, we're going to find ourselves in a situation that presents few (if any) easy answers. We're often left trying to lessen seizure frequency while trying to minimize the undesired effects of medication.

Whether seizures are controlled or not, I find that with a lot of the kids I see, epilepsy is often just the tip of the iceberg. Many of my patients have underlying and comorbid neurological or psychological conditions.

At Gillette Children's Specialty Healthcare, we are uniquely equipped to treat this patient population, primarily because providing integrated, multidisciplinary specialty care is what we do every day.

We also work with kids every day, and if there's anything I think our staff does distinctly well it's that we treat the whole patient, not just the symptoms of their condition.

Many of the parents I encounter have become experts in their child's condition. We encourage our families to

advocate and be educated about a condition that confuses many. Education starts in the clinic and continues with guided access to reliable online resources. At Gillette, we work with families as well as with you, to treat our patients, keep them safe, and get them to a place where they can become the most functional adult possible.

Because our focus is pediatrics, our staff provides care around the margins that you might not see at other facilities. We know that when working with someone's child, many of the little things, like the fact that our EEG technicians are great with kids, really can make a difference in how your patients experience health care.

We all have the same goals, and we're all trying to make sure that the kids living in our communities get to the facility that will provide them with the most optimized level of care.

First Seizure Clinic at Gillette Offers Options for Referring Providers

For obvious reasons, a first seizure event can be a traumatic thing for a family to experience. This can be especially true when experienced by an otherwise healthy child.

At Gillette Children's Specialty Healthcare, we serve many children in our region who have complex illnesses. The majority of our patients have underlying neurological conditions, so epilepsy is something we see a great deal of in clinic.

What may be less commonly known is that Gillette has a First Seizure Clinic devoted to treating otherwise healthy children who have recently experienced their first seizure. Monday through Friday, we have spots in our Neurology clinic designated specifically for seeing first seizure patients.

Because we are used to treating children who have complex conditions, treating the more straightforward cases of epilepsy is something we do quite well.

During their first visit, your patient will receive a comprehensive workup and exam. We'll conduct an EEG prior to their appointment, and make sure the family feels secure about their next steps going forward.

Much of our focus in that first visit is on education. We talk about what epilepsy is, what it isn't, and answer any of the questions our patients and families may have.

We know that following a first seizure event there is usually a fair amount of anxiety to manage. Because our practice is pediatrics, our entire staff is excellent at working with children and their families. It's our goal to help our patients navigate their path of treatment following a first seizure event.
